Dear friends

It was wonderful to see those images of Captain Tom Moore being knighted by the Queen with sword outstretched (an interesting technique for social distancing as someone commented!). The 100-year-old was recognised for his efforts to raise millions of pounds for charity during this global pandemic. Not everyone will have his stamina, but it's a reminder that one is never too old to be useful.

In our age, when youth is idolised and so often it feels as though the elderly are left on the scrap heap, I love the reminder of Psalm 92: "The righteous will flourish like a palm tree, they will grow like a cedar of Lebanon; planted in the house of the Lord, they will flourish in the courts of our God. They will still bear fruit in old age, they will stay fresh and green, proclaiming, 'The Lord is upright; he is my Rock, and there is no wickedness in him."

The Bible honours those in old age and recognises that "bearing fruit" can continue for a lifetime. We see this very clearly in our Parish, and we are enormously grateful for the gifts, energy and servant hearts of the many over 70s who serve in the life of the Parish, and who have been continuing to serve during the lockdown period. As the church unlocks and activities resume in person, we have been considering the following government advice: Certain groups of people may be at increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19, including people who are aged 70 or older, regardless of medical conditions. Individuals who fall within this group are advised to stay at home as much as possible and, if they do go out, to take particular care to minimise contact with others outside of their household.

In the light of this advice, recognising that other guidance uses the term "strongly advised", the Clergy and Parish Wardens would encourage those who are over 70 to take very seriously the government advice before volunteering for public ministry; however acknowledging wide differences in health, personal perceptions of risk, and personal desire to serve, we don't want to take away that opportunity for those more senior to be involved in ministry. Whilst not closing down the opportunity to serve, we also want to make clear that no one over 70 should feel pressured in any way to return to church gatherings or to serve in a public ministry until they feel entirely comfortable to do so. A ministry of prayer and encouragement from home will be of huge service to the church.

Praise God that He is building a Church that is multi-generational, and that everyone is equal in His family. Let's be continuing to pray for unity across the generations, and whatever age we are, that God might help each of us to be faithful in prayer and fruitful in service, for the glory of Jesus.
